# Agriculture & Agribusiness

Recently, CCE Broome's Agriculture Team kicked off *Exploring the Small Farm Dream* program. In response to COVID, the program was conducted via Zoom for the very first timie. This allowed 19 families to learn what it means to start a farm, learn about labor and financial considerations, market and revenue potential, as well as the pros and cons of owning a small business. At the completion of the program, participants will understand what it takes to start a farm or rural small business, and can then advance to creating a business plan.

Take for example the story of Wild Daisy Acres in Whitney Point. Just prior to the start of the pandemic, Elyssa Ellerson-Jones and Andrew Jones began the *Exploring the Small Farm Dream* program. Through it, the owners of Wild Daisy Acres, realized how they could benefit from the technical assistance CCE Broome's Ag Team offers. Now, through weekly meetings with Ag Team, they were able to complete a business plan and work with Farm Credit East to obtain a FarmStart (new farmer) loan. The loan allowed these new farmers to get their goat farm and beautiful goat's milk soap products (see photo left) business off to a great start. Congratulations to Wild Daisy Acres.

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# Ag in the Classroom

Thanks to NYS Ag and Markets, Ag in the Classroom (AITC) rwas able to respond to the growing interest in home gardens and carried out the Community Garden Grant. Through this grant, over 350 EarthBox© were distributed throughout Susquehanna Valley, Windsor, Whitney Point and Harpursville school districts, as well as the Whitney Point Senior Center, Harpursville Senior Center, Lisle Community Garden and Castle Creek Church. Families received an EarthBox © filled with soil, seeds, garden tools, cooking tools and information to get started growing.

Responding to the need to support parents/guardians as they help their children adjust to remote/virtual schooling, the AITC educators are providing lessons on goats, chickens, lamb, grapes, apples, cranberries, and pumpkins, in conjunction with Broome County Parks and CCE Broome's *Weeks Without Walls: An Outdoor Learning Adventure*.

# Horticulture

The Master Gardeners have been hard at work, harvesting vegetables from the Cutler Botanic Garden and making weekly donations to the CHOW Food Bank and Binghamton Food Rescue. To date, over 300 pounds of fresh vegetables have been donated to those most in need in our community.

This free, upcoming class is co-sponsored by CCE Broome and the Waterman Conservation Education Center, and will be offered via Zoom.

# RootED/ Empire State Afterschool Program

In partnership with Broome County Parks, Recreation & Youth Services CCE Broome's *Weeks Without Walls: An Outdoor Learning Adventure*, the RootED educators conducted a series of hands-on lessons in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) throughout September at Broome County's Cole, Dorchester, Greenwood and Otsiningo Parks designed to give parents project ideas and kits they can use at home to supplement and enhance their children's remote, virtual and hybrid school programs.

# 4-H UNITY Endicott

The changes to socially distanced In-person, remote and hybrid models in schools have posed unprecedented challenges to families throughout Broome County, including an alarming increase in the need for mental health services and supports, particularly among young people.

In response to this spike in mental health concerns, the Mental Health Association in New York State (MHANYS) recently hosted a panel discussion, *Reflecting, Rethinking, Responding to Support Student Mental Health Needs.* 4-H UNITY was honored to have UNITY Teen Leader Brianna Attey Mouanjo, a senior at Union-Endicott and caregiver for her young sister, invited by MHANYS to serve as a panelist for this discussion. The parent/caregiver panel reflected on how they plan to support the mental health needs of themselves and their families during these challenging times and make suggestions to MHANYS about the types of supports that would be most helpful to them.

## Parent Education

Limited resource families are facing extraordinary challenges during the pandemic. In response, CCE Broome's parent education is using innovative ways to reach out to those in most in need, working directly with families one-on-one, partnering with food pantries and afterschool programs. # **Nutrition Education**

Connecting with community partners has played a vital role in the essential work CCE Broome's Nutrition educators are doing in response to the pandemic. For example, through a partnership with Hillside Children's Center, families have been able to participate in a virtual six-week nutrition education and cooking program called *Summertime Eats*. The program highlights food safety, food resource management, the importance of increasing physical activity and how to develop the behaviors and skills necessary for improved health. As part of *Summertime Eats*, families receive "Salsa Gardens," courtesy of Hillside Children's Center, to encourage home gardening, as well as ingredients for cooking classes.

In collaboration with Broome County Parks and CCE Broome's *Weeks Without Walls: An Outdoor Learning Adventure*, the Nutrition Team is offering 28 free classes in the parks, based on SNAP and EFNEP programs. The classes include "Re-Think Your Drink," "Get Moving," "Fuel Up on Fruits and Vegetables", "Picnic in the Park" and "Lunch and Learn." The classes provide an opportunity for families to supplement or enhance their children's remote, virtual and hybrid school programs.

# CareerBound Workforce Development

In partnership with Broome-Tioga Workforce NY, CareerBound is hard at work, providing programming throughout the pandemic. Recently, CareerBound partnered with Visions Federal Credit Union for a virtual financial literacy training, conducted by Colleen Barton, Visions Financial Wellness Officer. CareerBound participants received with a \$25 coupon from Visions FCU for opening an account at Visions.
